



The National Interagency Fire Center (NIFC) has predicted that Wyoming is going to generally be in a "Normal" season of fire occurrence for 2016. They have produced these two maps for the season.



FIRESMART AND EAVETROUGHS/GUTTERS

Embers falling in roof gutters are an ignition source that could result in burning your home. And gutters full of leaves, needles, and forest litter, can do this, whether the gutters are plastic or metal. Plastic gutters melt, and fire will drip down the sides of your structure. Metal gutters usually don't melt, but when full can trap fire under the edges of your roofing. The only real solution is keeping your gutters and downspouts clean.

Full gutters can also pull gutters away from the house, causing water damage to the roof and all house parts below the gutters. These gaps are also entry points for flying embers.

If installing new gutters, metal is recommended.

Follow these tips at least once a year before fire season:

- 1) Ladders that extend above the gutters are best. Someone steadying the ladder is a safety bonus.
- 2) Start by scooping out **all** of the flammable material with a trowel or small garden shovel, while wearing gloves to reduce hand damage from sharp gutter edges and pointed sticks.
- 3) Use a garden hose to flush the downspouts to clear them before and after hosing out the full length of each gutter.



While you are on the ladder, tap the anchoring nails to pull the gutter back flush with the roof, and make fixes to any annoying leaks discovered when flushing with the hose.

All of the above tips also apply to gutters with a cover screens. These do keep out some leaves and debris, but flammable materials often get trapped under them, so they should be

removed during cleaning, and then reinstalled.


Firewood pile location


I irewood stacked next to a house (illustration 1) is a ready source of ignition and can become a source of intense, sustained heat if it should catch fire. This could ignite the house's siding or eaves, and cause the windows to break, allowing fire to enter the house.

To eliminate this problem, either move the firewood 20 feet from the house (2) during fire season, or build an enclosure around the firewood (3).











A bit more distance, please.

A flaming firewood pile that's too close to a home (left) could catch the wood siding on fire and blow out windows — giving fire access to the home's interior. Thirty feet of open space between the firewood pile and the house will greatly help the home outlive the firewood pile.



ANNUAL PRE-FIRE-SEASON FIREWISE WALK-AROUND CHECKLIST

Once a home or cabin has been made Firewise, the owner can't sit back and enjoy it. Vegetation will continue to grow, and human activities will change the situation on an irregular basis.

BEFORE FIRE SEASON:
Remove leaves and forest litter from gutters, roofs, and within 3 feet of all structures
Clean chimney screens
Cut new small trees and shrubs within the 100-foot zone
Remove dead trees within the 100-foot zone
Check your address placard or sign for clear visibility
Move your conveniently-placed winter woodpile to more than 30 feet from all structures
Check/replace the batteries in your emergency alert radio
Inspect your powerline for branches within four feet in all directions
Check window screens for a tight fit, and patch any holes
Remove leaf and needles between the boards of decks, and under any decks and porches.
Check walls and foundation for fresh bird and animal holes, and patch appropriately
Pick up winter-broken limbs within the 100-foot zone
Remove flammable materials from decks and porches, except when actually in use
Review your evacuation plan, and share it with the family and guests

BEFORE GRASS CURES IN MID-SUMMER:
Mow grassy areas around all structures
Mow grass within and adjacent to driveways
